10 cloves garlic, peeled 6 cups chicken broth 1-1/2 heads of cauliflower Salt and white pepper, to taste 1 cup half & half Sour cream, optional



In a soup pot, simmer the cauliflower and garlic in the broth for about 45 minutes. After cooking, leave in pan and use a potato masher to break up. MICHIGAN BUZZ Great Lakes Lighthouse Festival

On September 15, 1998, the State of Michigan proclaimed October as Lighthouse Awareness Month. But before this, earnest plans for the first Great Lakes Lighthouse Festival began in 1995. The Festival's organizing committee longed to present an educational and entertaining forum in which Michigan's lighthouses could be appreciated.

The Festival now draws hundreds of enthusiasts to Alpena each year. It capitalizes on Lighthouse Awareness Month and encourages others to join efforts in protecting Michigan's numerous lighthouses.

In addition to showcasing lighthouses, the Festival promotes public awareness. On October 11 it will highlight the Michigan Lighthouse Assistance Program, which funds lighthouse preservation throughout the state with money generated from the sale of Save Our Lights license plates. This effort allows the State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) to grant money to lighthouse stewards for the preservation of lighthouses and related buildings.

Since 2000 the SHPO has awarded more than \$1.5 million in Michigan Lighthouse Assistance Program grants. For information about the MLAP, visit

The four-day Great Lakes Lighthouse Festival will be held October 10-13, 2013, at the APlex, 701 Woodward Avenue, Alpena, Participants will be treated to displays of photography, as well as artists, crafters, and authors. They will also have an opportunity to visit 12 lighthouses, from Tawas to Mackinaw. Weather permitting, boat tours will go to Middle Island and Thunder Bay Island Lighthouses, and helicopter photo tours to up to five different lighthouses.

HEALTH BUZZ New Four-Strain Flu Vaccine for 2013-14

Flu vaccines in the United States have for years been designed to protect against three strains of flu. But during the 2013 to 2014 flu season, a vaccine that protects against four strains will offered for the first time.

Because flu strains around the world are constantly changing, a new flu vaccine is made every year. Scientists make the vaccine before flu season starts by predicting which strains are likely to be the most common during the upcoming season.

This year's four-component flu vaccine will contain two influenza A strains, H1N1 and H3N2, and two influenza B strains.

About 135 million to 139 million doses of flu vaccine are projected to be available during the 2013 to 2014 flu season. Of those, about 30 million will be the four-strain vaccine. The rest will be a three-strain vaccine.

The precise time when flu season starts and ends is unpredictable, so health officials recommend people get their flu shot in early fall, before activity starts to rise. Flu viruses typically peak in January or February.

The 2013-2014 flu vaccine is available starting this fall. Some flu vaccine manufacturers began shipping this year's vaccine to health care providers in September.

Effectiveness of the yearly flu vaccine depends upon several factors, including how well the flu strains in the vaccine match the strains in circulation. Other ways to protect yourself include washing your hands to prevent the spread of germs and staying home from school or work when you are sick. Also avoid contact with others who have flu-like symptoms.

BUZZ BACK IN TIME Elmwood Cemetery Oldest in Michigan

If you ask someone what the oldest continuously operating cemetery in Michigan is, they will likely tell you Elmwood Cemetery in Detroit. This integral piece of Michigan history was founded in the spring of 1846, when a handful of Detroit's leading citizens decided to create a cemetery in the city's suburbs. They purchased forty-two acres from the George Hunt Farm in Hamtramck for the sum of \$1,850.



The cemetery was incorporated three years later as a non-profit organization. In 1883, an endowment fund was created for the perpetual care of the cemetery and individual lots. Over the years, additional land was purchased from the Hunt Farm and neighboring farm of D.C. Whitwood so that today the cemetery consists of approximately eighty-six acres.

Apart from its age, Elmwood boasts a group of celebrated and prominent citizens who are buried in its sacred ground. A special lot is designated for those who fought in the Civil War, and it is one of the few places in America where the flag is flown continuously as a memorial to those patriots.

Also buried there are W.A. Burt, the inventor of the Equatorial sextant and solar compass, and Margaret Mather, the great Shakespearean actress of the nineteenth century. Other notables include governors, mayors, judges, ministers, lawyers, doctors, businessmen and abolitionists.

Additional noteworthy persons memorialized at Elmwood include Lewis Cass, Michigan's Territorial Governor; Douglass Houghton, Michigan's first State Geologist; Eber Brock War, Michigan's first millionaire; and General Philip St. George Cook, who led the Mormon Battalion to Los Angeles in 1846, raising the flag at Fort Tucson along the way.



Belle Isle Closer to Becoming State Park

Belle Isle could soon become Michigan's 102nd state park under a partnership between the city of Detroit and state of Michigan. The signed 30-year lease will relieve city financial pressures, revitalize the park and improve the quality of life for city residents.

The lease was signed by Governor Rick Snyder on Tuesday, October 1, and then transmitted to the city of Detroit. Under Public Act 436, the law governing emergency managers, the City Council has 10 days to approve or disapprove the lease. If the Council rejects the lease, it has an additional seven days to advance an alternative that would save the same amount of money or more as the lease.

"Detroit's current financial condition prohibits the city from investing in the much-needed restoration of Belle Isle," said Mayor Dave Bing.

Under the lease, the city will maintain ownership of Belle Isle while the Michigan DNR will assume responsibility for management. The Michigan Department of Transportation will assume responsibility for roads and bridges on Belle Isle. The DNR will begin to improve the park immediately following a 90day transition period based on a detailed one-year phased management plan that is included in the lease.

State management of the island will save Detroit a minimum of \$4 million a year. In addition, the state will invest in the island through a variety of sources, including grants, bonds and donations from private organizations willing to partner in the park's revitalization. State investment will amount to between \$10 million and \$20 million in the first 18-36 months of state management.

A 7-member advisory committee will advise the state on improvements and master planning for the park. Park revenue will be placed in a special subaccount in the Department of Natural Resources State Park Improvement Fund to administer, maintain and improve the park. The balance of that sub-account will transfer to the city upon termination of the lease.
